COPYRIGHT

All video content must be your **own original work**. You must ensure you have **copyright approval** and **permission** to include images, audio or video created by anyone other than yourself. The **winning entries will be shared online** so it is critical that they comply with copyright law.



FREE IMAGE LIBRARY

Source images from a **free image library**.

There are many online sites that offer **public domain**, **royalty-free and Creative Commons** music and images that students can

include in their videos.



CREATIVE COMMONS

Find material that is available under a **creative commons license**. Creative Commons (CC) is a system of licenses that allows creators to give permission for others to use their work, like photos, music, or writing, under specific conditions.





MAKE IT YOURSELF!

This is the simplest way to avoid copyright headaches.
In our last competition we saw **animation**, **reenactments**and **stop motion** all used to tell stories!
These were some of the best entries. There are lots of **free**, **open-source** animation programs available online.



ASK FOR PERMISSION

Where possible, **ask** the person being profiled to provide images to use in your video. If you find something online you really want to use, ask the (c) holder for **permission** to use it in your video.



PRIVACY

If you chose to appear in your video, make sure you **protect** your **privacy**. Parental **consent** has been obtained for all participating children/students. For more info, refer to the **terms and conditions**.
